## HAWAI'I COMMUNITY FOUNDATION AWARDS OVER \$400K FROM THE RICHARD SMART FUND TO 18 PROGRAMS SUPPORTING WAIMEA

Series of community conversations helped prioritize needs in support of a thriving Waimea

**Honolulu, HAWAI'I** — Today, the Hawai'i Community Foundation (HCF) is announcing the award of \$415,770 from the Richard Smart Fund to 18 programs supporting culture, education, health, and safety in Waimea on Hawai'i Island. Community organizations and residents participated in a series of conversations throughout 2023 that helped to advise the Richard Smart Fund and HCF on the top priorities and greatest needs of community members.

Richard Palmer Kaleioku Smart established the Richard Smart Fund at HCF when he created the Parker Ranch Foundation Trust to support healthcare, educational, and charitable giving for the Waimea community on Hawai'i Island. From 2001 to 2023, HCF distributed over \$7.7 million to nonprofit organizations serving Waimea.

"These grants from the Richard Smart Fund are the result of Waimea community members describing the future they want for Waimea, a future where all of the residents of the community understand and embody their kuleana for each other and the 'āina," said HCF director of donor relations for Hawai'i Island Diane Chadwick. "The funding also aligns with HCF's long-term strategy to elevate community voices and position Hawai'i as a model for local and global civic responsibility and collaborative policy development."

"The Hawai'i Songwriting Festival is honored to be a recipient of a Richard Smart Fund grant. With these funds, we will be able to expand our programs and career development opportunities for the growing music community in Waimea," says Julia Brotman, executive director of the Hawai'i Songwriting Festival.

Naka Nathaniel, a board member of the Kawaihae Canoe Club, says, "Our club does its best to try to create pilina and deepen relationships in our community, and HCF has been incredibly supportive of our efforts. We can't mahalo them enough."

The proposals were evaluated based on the following criteria: what their kuleana is for Waimea's future, how their work addresses critical opportunities for Waimea's future, how they contribute to strengthening caring relationships, and how they effectively involve and engage with the community's diverse people, organizations, and 'āina.

Collaboration and policy development will be further supported by building on the momentum that began with the community conversations by bringing together a learning cohort with these grantees to share indigenous knowledge and innovative approaches to addressing issues such as water and land management, economic development, and educating all members of the community about creating a vibrant future for Waimea.
